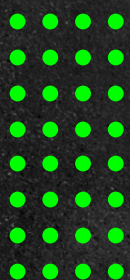

Most instructors aren't missing skill. They're missing teaching strategy.

3. The Two Paths of Instructional Mastery

There are two tracks to reach instructional excellence:

1. **Personal growth as a lead instructor/owner**
2. **Developing your team into assistant and lead instructors**

Miss either one and your impact hits a ceiling:

- You'll burn out trying to carry everything alone
- Or plateau because your staff can't support growth

Instructional mastery isn't about replacing yourself — it's about multiplying your leadership through others.

4. Your Role as a Lead Instructor: Teaching vs. Leading

Most owners teach well. But few lead their staff to teach like they do.

If you're still:

- Teaching every class
- Jumping in to “fix” everything
- Doing mat chats while your staff stands silent

Then you haven’t leveled up.

The shift:

Technician	Warrior Instructor
Runs drills	Creates momentum
Fixes form	Builds belief
Teaches alone	Builds a team
Corrects errors	Develops confidence

Leading instructors:

- Set class tone
- Cast vision
- Coach team
- Build consistency

5. Building the Next Generation: How to Train Your Staff Instructors

Strong instructors aren’t born. They’re built.

A simple progression:

1. **Shadowing** — observe and note
2. **Co-teaching** — lead 1–2 sections with guidance
3. **Solo teaching** — lead start-to-finish
4. **Debrief and feedback** — weekly coaching and support

Add:

- Staff class templates
- Weekly instructor huddles
- Recognition for leadership moments

Great staff instruction isn’t about performance — it’s about **presence, tone, and preparation.**

6. Warrior Instruction in Action: What It Looks Like on the Mat

True Warrior instruction is visible from the first bow.

Students feel:

- Valued and seen
- Energized and focused
- Pushed but supported
- Clear on expectations and next steps

Instructors:

- Use names
- Keep momentum
- Layer in life lessons
- Correct without shame
- Deliver mat chats that matter

When instruction flows like this, your retention soars — and your culture becomes magnetic.
